'Lucky Doxastic Justification'

currently under review

(I argue that it's possible for a belief to be doxastically justified only luckily. I then examine whether merely lucky doxastic justification is consistent with knowledge - I argue it is.)

'Epistemic Axiology and a Case Against Veritism'

currently under review

(I argue that veritism - the idea that epistemic value is rooted only in the importance of truth - is false. Something in addition to truth serves as a fundamental epistemic value and grounds epistemic evaluative facts. I examine and reject plausible veritist replies.)

'Sacrificing Epistemic Goods'

e-mail for draft

(I argue that we can be distinctly morally praiseworthy for the good will we exhibit in our epistemic behavior. I then introduce the concept of *epistemic sacrifice*: the forgoing of an epistemic good for a moral good. Similar to how prudential sacrifice works, agents can be *more* morally praiseworthy if believing/behaving morally well comes at an epistemic cost.)

'Internalist Perspectives on Encroachment'

(I propose an internalist variant of encroachment views of epistemic justification. My view maintains that relevant pragmatic features related to a belief only encroach on the belief's justificatory status if the agent's evidence indicates that they obtain.)

'Etiology and Epistemic Evaluation'

e-mail for draft

(Restrictivism says that only doxastic attitudes that were formed as an expression of an agent's epistemic agency (e.g. not implanted or spontaneous) can serve as fundamentally valuable epistemic goods. I argue against this view.)

'Vividness Dualism: A Dualist Account of Epistemic Goods'

(I propose an account of epistemic evaluation according to which there are two species of fundamental epistemic values: veridicality (truth) and vividness (richness and coherence).)

'Epistemic Pluralism and The Allure of Misinformation'

(I claim that species of epistemic pluralism which recognize a sort of coherence as a fundamental epistemic value (rather than *just* truth) can better make sense of the allure of misinformation. Propaganda and misinformation thrive because they offer victims cohesive, though false, representations of the world.)
